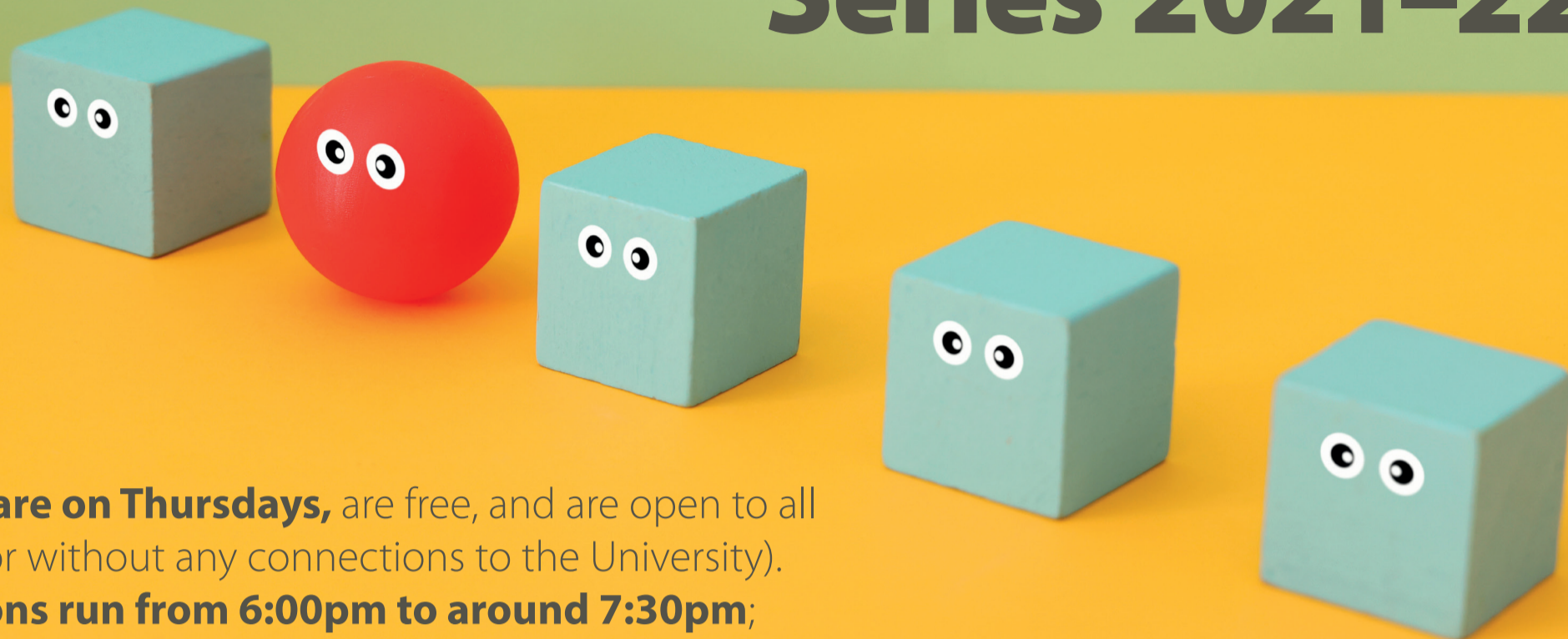


Institute of Gender Studies

21 st Oct. 2021	Dr Apryl Alexander	Preventing and Addressing Gender-Based Violence with Youth	Many systems-involved youth have experienced gender-based violence prior to engaging in illegal behaviour. Apryl Alexander, Associate Professor in the Graduate School of Professional Psychology at the University of Denver, discusses the need for trauma-informed care as a means of gender-based violence prevention.
18 th Nov. 2021	Professor Sasha Roseneil	Common Knowledge? Understanding, representations and memories of Greenham Forty Years On	Sasha Roseneil is Professor of Interdisciplinary Social Science, Dean of the Faculty of Social and Historical Science, and Pro-Provost (Equity & Inclusion) at UCL. She is the author of two books about Greenham Common, published – as she says – a long time ago now! Prof. Roseneil will be introduced by IGS MRes graduate Declan Penrose.
16 th Dec. 2021	Dr Coco d’Hont	How Female Is the Future? Unpacking Gender in Contemporary Metal Music	Coco d’Hont is the author of <i>Extreme States: The Evolution of American Transgressive Fiction</i> (2019). Her research focuses on horror fiction, pop music, and its intersections with gender and sexuality. Dr d’Hont will be introduced by IGS PhD student Holly Royle.
20 th Jan. 2022	Dr Sharif Mowlabocus	Interrogating Homonormativity: Gay Male Culture after Marriage Equality	Sharif Mowlabocus is an Associate Professor at Fordham University, NYC. His research explores 21st-century gay male culture, representation and politics. He has authored two books: <i>Gaydar Culture</i> (2010) and <i>Interrogating Homonormativity</i> (2021). Dr Mowlabocus will be introduced by IGS PhD student Liz Hendy.
24 th Feb. 2022	Professor Virginia Braun	Thematic analysis: (Don’t) believe the hype!	A feminist critical health psychologist at The University of Auckland, Virginia Braun is also passionate about qualitative researching. With collaborator Victoria Clarke, she recently published <i>Thematic Analysis: A Practical Guide</i> . Professor Braun will be introduced by IGS PhD student Gill Badrock.
24 th March 2022	Professor Sally Hines	Gender Fluidity: Progress and Pushbacks in the UK Today	Professor Sally Hines is Chair of Sociology at the University of Sheffield. Her book, <i>Is Gender Fluid?: A Primer for the 21st Century</i> , was published in 2020. Sally’s currently working on two large ESRC-funded projects, one looking at trans masculine pregnancy and one addressing young people’s experiences of gender. Professor Hines will be introduced by IGS PhD student Kate Naylor.
